## President's Report

Dr Andrew Cornwell, NJCA President

2022/23 was a season of new beginnings, challenges and ultimately, success.

In July we bade farewell to our administrator Dave Wild. Dave was our first employed administrator for some years, and his hard work and diligence will leave a legacy for many years to come.

Thank you Dave.

In August we were fortunate to have Sharon Dare join the team as our new administrator. Sharon has brought tremendous administrative skills, an eye for detail and a passion for cricket. We could not have dealt with this season's challenges without her drive and positivity. On behalf of the association and our players I would like to sincerely thank Sharon for all her hard work over the past season.

The season also saw the introduction of a new scoring and administration platform by Cricket Australia, PlayHQ. This replaced MyCricket which had been in place and refined for many years. The association and clubs still managed to open registrations on time – a remarkable achievement. I would like to both congratulate and thank Sharon and all the clubs for their perseverance in ensuring a new and imperfect system still delivered all our registrations successfully.

Sharon conducted a "masterclass" for scorers prior to the season and within a couple of rounds, over 90% of junior games were successfully being live scored. This stands in stark contrast to many other associations where live scoring is still the exception rather than the rule. The system is still in its infancy, and most of us would consider that its introduction was probably premature. Nonetheless, our scorers, coaches, clubs, and Sharon ensured that it was rolled out successfully.

Our numbers were up 5% to approximately 1500 player competing in some 137 teams. The season also saw the introduction of the new Friday night Premier League. This competition provides a steppingstone from junior to senior cricket with longer formats available and fewer restrictions on batters and bowlers. We also saw the introduction of an all-girls blasters smash and all girls Sixers League for or stage 1 cricketers. Many thanks to the girls committee for providing an all-girls pathway from junior right through to senior cricket.

Unfortunately, the season also began during a La Nina weather event, which delivered higher than normal rainfall until after Christmas. January saw the weather improve and the rest of the season continued largely uninterrupted. This presented challenges for clubs, in terms of training, and the association, due to widespread ground unavailability. This also served to highlight the inadequacy of drainage on many of our junior grounds.

Poor quality facilities adversely impact the player experience for our juniors, and good quality facilities enhance player enjoyment. To address this, the NJCA introduced a \$20 per player infrastructure levy directed at improving and replacing centre wickets. Prior to this season, Cricket NSW (Tim Cox and

Frankie Walsh) produced a priority list based on usage and the quality of the pitch, which current committee member Chris Wharton is using to get the centre wicket upgrade ball rolling. Funds raised this year are being directed towards replacing the wickets at Lewis and Pickering Ovals and widening and synthetic replacement at Novocastrian. Wallarah was also a priority until it was announced in March that the new basketball stadium was to be built there. We are working with Newcastle Council to improve that wicket to a playable standard until such times as it goes offline.

The association was successful in 2022 in obtaining a \$2.56m grant from the state government to upgrade Smith Park. Smith Park is the epicentre of Newcastle junior cricket and the NJCA are excited to bring it up to an appropriate standard. We have been working with Newcastle Council to finalise the scope and design of this work. This upgrade will deliver a laser levelled and fully drained playing surface as well as three new centre wickets. It is anticipated that it will be offline for about 18 months starting in February 2024, however it will deliver a first-rate facility for local junior games as well as for the Ron Arendts carnival.

In September 2022 we lost one of our treasured life members, Jim Brennan. Jim had spent much of his life improving our junior players both as cricketers and as people. His legacy is a living one – in the players he influenced over his lifetime. Our Smith Park nets are named in his honour.

Vale Jim.

This season saw representative cricket move from the NJCA to the Newcastle Zone. This creates a clear representative pathway from junior cricket through to senior cricket. Our results across junior and senior representative teams saw the Newcastle Zone win the coveted Hogg Shield. This is the trophy for the most successful country NSW zone in representative cricket across all age groups and genders. Many congratulations to all the teams involved, and a huge thank you to all the coaches, parents and managers who helped make it happen. This included wins in the Bradman Cup, Female U16 Country Championships and Female U15 Country Youth Championships. Many thanks to Alloggio for their generous sponsorship of all our junior rep teams.

In addition to this, the NJCA held our two carnivals – the U11 Ron Arendts carnival and the U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield. These attracted the best cricketers in their age groups from right across NSW. The feedback from the visiting teams was universally positive and these carnivals not only provide opportunities for our cricketers, but also serve to show off our wonderful region.

Having seen a lot of change in the 2022/23 season, the NJCA sees the upcoming season as one to consolidate and build upon this year's successes.

Finally, I would like to thank the NJCA committee, the club committees and the many volunteers that make our game what it is, and I hope to see you all next season.

## Administrator's Report

Season 2022/23 was another extraordinary one, for different reasons though to the recent few seasons that have been dubbed the same. 2022/23 was the season of change...... It saw a change in:

- NJCA Administrator
- CNSW personnel
- Junior competition offerings
- Weather (for the better, thankfully)
- and last but certainly not least, competition management system, aka PlayHQ.

Firstly, I would personally like to thank the NJCA executive & committee, all the NJCA club volunteers who I have worked with over the season, as well as the umpire allocators, not only for your dedication to our junior cricketers, but also for the patience and support you gave me as a brand-new administrator. Having the role of CNSW Cricket Manager vacated at the beginning of the season certainly added a challenge for us all, however we managed to produce a very successful season none the less. I look forward to bigger and better things next season with the support of the new Cricket NSW Area Manager for Newcastle, Leya Wilson.

#### Weather

The summer of 2022/23 saw some much-needed sunshine on our local sporting fields, something we haven't seen a lot of in recent seasons! I'm sure I speak for everyone when I say how relieved I was to see some relatively stable weather, once we got past the round 1 complete washout, of course. Not only did season 22/23 see largely dry conditions, but it was also free from air quality issues and, for the most part, extreme heat. I've ordered the same weather again next season.

#### Registrations

Season 2022/23 saw 137 teams from 15 clubs play junior cricket across 21 grades. 125 of these teams played in the traditional mixed competitions and 12 played in the All Girls competitions. 126 of these teams participated in the Friday/Saturday competition, with the remaining 11 playing midweek T20 Social Bash.

As a whole, registrations remained fairly steady from season 2021/22 to 2022/23. Participation went up slightly (around 5%) at approximately 1500 participants, with many participants playing across multiple formats, eg Saturday as well as midweek. Female participation remains around 15% of total participation. There was a slight decrease in female participants in the Junior competition however we saw an increase in females in Summer Smash.

#### **PlayHQ**

This season saw the move away from MyCricket, after approximately 20 years as the competition management System. MyCricket was no longer being supported so Cricket Australia had to find another platform; welcome PlayHQ....!

Love it or hate it, the inaugural season for PlayHQ was, overall, very successful. After an understandably nervous start, most teams were e-Scoring on PlayHQ by round 2 or 3 – a fantastic result from the wonderful NCJA volunteers! Of course, it wasn't without its faults, but full credit to everyone involved for making it work the best way we could. A huge shout out to club committees for the extra time and effort they put in to learn the system themselves as well as upskill and support their club community.

#### Change in formats.

This season NJCA tweaked the format of the older age groups to come in line with Cricket Australia recommendations, by combining U15 – U18 in one age group and offering multiple divisions. There was also the introduction of the Friday Night Premier League, which was Division 1 of this U15-18 competition, played on a Friday evening rather than Saturday morning. This opened the opportunity to our older and more developed cricketers to continue to play junior cricket with their friends whilst also extending their cricketing career in grade cricket. The Friday Night Premier League was a mix of 20 over and 40 over cricket, giving these older juniors experience with the longer format as they head into senior cricket.

The NJCA will continue with the same grades and formats into next season, with some minor improvements based on positive and constructive coach and manager feedback.

#### **Girls Cricket**

It was wonderful to see girls cricket in Newcastle continue to grow this season. At the beginning of the season the Newcastle was the first region in NSW to offer a complete pathway for female cricket, from Blasters right through to Women's. Being the first season for some of these offerings there were not the numbers to get them all off the ground, however Newcastle cricket will continue to offer increased and improved experiences for female cricketers in the seasons to come. A wonderful event for females in sport is the Girls Day Out (GDO), a 1-day, annual event for 5-16 year old girls to try a multitude of sports, cricket included. It was inspiring to see some of our up-and-coming junior female cricketers involved in the GDO this season. I would like to thank Julie Wharton for making this event successful for cricket this year, with a moments notice!

#### **Summer Smash**

Summer Smash is our all-important introduction to 'real' cricket for the younger kids who have either graduated Blasters or are completely new to cricket. It's the breeding ground for our future stars! This season saw a huge jump in numbers for Summer Smash. It's run in Term 1 in two hubs - Lake Macquarie and Newcastle. The Lake Macquarie hub remained steady, with 4 teams at Ulinga Ovals, Cardiff South, on a Monday afternoon. The Newcastle hub absolutely exploded, with a whopping 10 teams across 2 venues, including 2 all girls teams! The Newcastle hub is traditionally played at Smith Park, Hamilton South, and this year saw the introduction of Adamstown 4 & 5 to accommodate the growing numbers.



After some positive and constructive feedback from families, I look forward to seeing this competition get bigger and better next season.

Once again – well done and THANK YOU to each and every person who contributed to junior cricket, particularly in such a challenging season. It's 100% the contribution you all make, small or large, out of the goodness of your heart, that combines to create an invaluable experience for our local kids and promotes the great game of cricket.

## Newcastle's 'Celebration of Cricket'

Newcastle's 'Celebration of Cricket' incorporates the U11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield and the U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield and saw 450 junior cricketers participating in 90 games of cricket over 8 days in January.

This year Newcastle Cricket as a whole was successful in gaining \$15,000 of sponsorship from the City of Newcastle, which was shared between the NJCA and the NDCA (seniors). I would like to thank City of Newcastle for their financial support as well as their contribution to the presentations of the U11 and U14 carnivals. We were very honoured to have Counsellor Winney-Baartz involved in both carnivals in the absence of Lord Mayor Nuatali Nelmes. We look forward to a continued partnership with the City of Newcastle again next season.

#### **Under 11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield**

Season 2022/23 saw NJCA host its 16th U11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield Carnival, which has been going since 2007 (less one year for COVID). This very popular carnival was a huge success again. There were 200 participants across 16 teams who travelled from as far south as Wollongong in the Illawarra and as far north as Grafton on the Far North Coast, and everywhere in between!

One noticeable difference this year was the absence of the late, great Jim Brennan, who has been involved with these carnivals, as well as the NJCA and cricket in general, for more years than can be counted. His legacy will live on at the U11 Ron Arendts Memorial Carnival, with the introduction of the "Jim Brennan Player of the Carnival" award, for the U11 Ron Arendts player with the most umpire votes at the end of the carnival. The grand final was contested at Smith Park between one of the two Parramatta teams and Hornsby Ku-ring-gai & Hills. It was very hard fought and closely matched, coming down to the last over. Congratulations to Parramatta, who came away with the win and the 2023 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield!



The carnival was run over 4 days, 3 of which were unaffected by weather. Day 3 was touch and go but after a lot of communication, squidging and patience all games proceeded, albeit shortened and delayed. The format of the carnival remained unchanged, with 2 x T20s on day 1 followed by 40 overs matches the following 3 days.

The coaches and managers meeting went ahead the morning of Day 1, just prior to team photos. Whilst this was successful, it will be improved on for next season by having more physical space between the two gatherings. Firstly to minimise external noise at the meeting, as well to minimise the unintentional 'photobombers' in the team photos! The team 'show bags' were well received, containing essentials such as toilet paper and garbage bags, along with a sweet treat.

All matches had official umpires, with 2 umpires on the 2 x semis and the grand final – a huge thank you to Alf Ellevsen for organising umpires for the 40 matches across the 4 days.

Newcastle region entered 3 teams, Newcastle U13 girls, Newcastle U11 boys & Lake Macquarie U11 boys. Despite between them only winning 4 matches across the 4 days, these local teams represented the Newcastle area with commitment and pride, and they had a lot of fun along the way.

#### **U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield**

Two weeks later the U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield got under way for the 42nd time, having been established in 1982. This popular carnival saw 250 participants from 20 teams compete across the four days. Like the U11 carnival, teams came from far and wide, from the Illawarra to the Far North Coast and everywhere in between. Newcastle region entered 2 teams, Lake Macquarie Attack and Newcastle Blasters.

Due to high demand, 20 teams were invited to participate in the carnival this year. The 20 teams were divided into 5 pools of 4 teams, with each team playing every team in their pool once over the first 2 days, and the top 4 teams on points and NRR going through to play the semis. The format remained unchanged from last year; 2 x T20s on day 1 followed by 40 over matches on the remaining 3 days.

The grand finalists this year were NJCA's own Lake Macquarie Attack and Penrith Black. Unfortunately, after 3 beautiful, sunny days, the grand final was delayed, interrupted and eventually abandoned due to the persistent wet weather on day 4, and these two teams were declared joint winners of the 2023 Graeme Malcolm Shield. Newcastle Blasters finished third in their pool.



As disappointing as it was to have the final day washed out, we were grateful for 3 dry days beforehand and the early finish on day 4. It should be noted that there was one of the ten scheduled matches completed on the final day, albeit shortened. This one was played at Lindsay Memorial Park in Beresfield between Manly and North Coast. A huge thank you must go to all the players and officials and particularly the curators for the efforts made and patience shown in trying to get the kids to play that day.

Huge thanks again to Alf Ellevsen for his tireless efforts in getting umpire allocations successfully filled for all 50 matches across the 4 days, which included umpiring a match or 2 himself to fill last minute vacancies. THANK YOU Alf.

Carnivals like these do not happen without the help of many, and the 2023 carnivals were no different. As a first-time carnival coordinator, I am boundlessly grateful for the assistance I received from many, both in the lead up to the carnivals and during the carnivals. So many people generously donated their time to make these events come to life so successfully, and I look forward to working with many of them again next season.

## <u>Cricket NSW Community Cricket Experience, Season Review</u>

On behalf of Cricket NSW I wish to thank all volunteers involved in the delivery of Cricket in Newcastle during the season whether administering at Association or Club level, coaching teams, providing transport, scoring matches, preparing pitches, making lunches or officiating – thank you for providing the inspiration for thousands of boys and girls to love and play Cricket.

The Community Cricket Experience stream employs staff across the state to lead and support clubs and associations to deliver world-class Cricket experiences. Some are in front-line roles such as Cricket Managers, Blast Specialists and Competition Administrators, others provide are Subject Matter Experts providing guidance and expertise in areas such as Governance, Compliance, Infrastructure, Competition Management and Coach Education.

The role of the Cricket Manager is to :-

- Maintain key relationships with clubs and associations.
- Support retention strategies.
- Drive incremental participation growth in clubs and associations.
- Assist clubs to grow school-to-club transition.

There are six Cricket Manager Regions servicing Northern NSW and we're thrilled with the latest member to join our team in Leya Wilson to manage Newcastle.

It's not that long ago that Newcastle and Lake Macquarie each had a Cricket Manager. This hasn't always been the case and for years earlier, the Newcastle Cricket Manager was responsible for Lake Macquarie and the Hunter Valley. Cricket administration has been affected like many other industries and, combined with a reduction in state distributions and an internal review, there have been changes to strategy, reduction in field force and re-alignment of regions.

The departure of Tim Cox in October and Frankie Walsh taking on another role within the organisation left a huge gap and I'd like to congratulate the NJCA on it's organisation and leadership to navigate the 2022/23 season with special mention to new Administrator Sharon Dare whose enthusiasm and focus on grass-roots participation has no boundaries. While Newcastle didn't miss out on any opportunities during the Summer, it's fair to say we were limited in hands-on club support until Leya's appointment.

The season started early with the inaugural Community Cricket Roadshows held in May at locations around the state featuring Cricket NSW CEO Lee Germon, members of the Executive Leadership team and local Cricket NSW staff. The purpose of the roadshows was to connect and listen to local volunteers and discuss emerging from the pandemic & floods, trends in organised sport, the health of club cricket and the Cricket NSW Strategy 2021-25. Attendees participated in workshops with several key themes emerging such as volunteer retention challenges, more support needed to administer competitions and education support for mum and dad coaches. The solutions included:-

- Build from the bottom, increasing the number of 5-12 year-olds playing the game.
- Offer Competition Administration to associations.
- Increase WW Cricket Blast participants including all-female and community centres.

- Work with associations to establish all-female junior competitions.
- Provide more support for Mum and dad coaches and promote use of the CA Coach App.

The introduction of a new competition management system, PlayHQ, replacing the ageing MyCricket platform was challenging for all. What wasn't properly prosecuted was the need to replace the twenty year-old technology, which on the surface looked to be doing what the customer wanted, however it caused all sorts of headaches in the back end with band-aids covering band-aids. While the new system may not have provided a great plug and play experience, it was interesting to note that associations with competition administration had less issues and the benefits moving forward will be significant for both players and volunteers.

There were several positives during the season in Newcastle:-

The annual Country Blitz featuring NSW male and female players visited the area in August to support club recruitment.

More that sixty kids attended a Sixers Super Clinic and BBQ featuring Sydney Sixers WBBL stars.

Association starter PlayHQ workshops were followed up by webinars to support clubs.

Supporting the NJCA's Blast 500 initiative, Cricket NSW provided coach education and training sessions for Blast Coordinators and Junior team coaches.



A number of coaching clinics and competitions were run during the school holidays.

Other highlights across Northern NSW included:-

The BBL fixture in Coffs Harbour was another sellout with Steve Smith scoring the first ever hundred by a Sixers male player.

Increased number of Associations signed up for Competition Administration.

Adam Gilchrist's T20 Flood Relief match in Lismore featured a number of former Test players.

Huge registrations were received for targeted Term 1 Community Blast centres at Kempsey and Woolgoolga.



Overall, participation in Newcastle was down slightly on the previous season across all formats from entry level Cricket Blast to junior mixed and female competitions.

## NJCA Girls Cricket Officer Report

Season 2022-2023 saw great participation by junior female cricketers across Newcastle, in our NJCA mixed and all girls competitions, the various Woolworths Cricket Blast Centres within club run blast programs and Cricket NSW programs, and the continued growth of the Cricket Australia aligned Daughters & Dads Cricket program.

The Sixers Girls League Stage 1 & Stage 2 competitions fielded over 116 junior female players, with the formats moved to align with the Cricket Australia Junior formats, and both Stage 1 and Stage 2 Sixers Girls Leagues played on a Saturday morning.

#### Junior Cricket - Mixed formats

66 junior female players participated in the NJCA Junior Cricket Competition formats, from U10 right through to U18. The U14 Division 2 competition featured the all girls City Vixens team, composed of players from both Newcastle City and Valentine Eleebana. This team progressed through to the U14 Division 2 Grand Final with a narrow loss but commendable performance against Wests.

#### Senior Cricket - Women's Competition

While not an NJCA Competition, the developing Newcastle District Cricket Association Women's T20 Competition continued to grow to a two division competition, featuring 52 female players aged under 18, with 31 of those players exclusively playing their community cricket in this competition.

The Cricket Australia endorsed Daughters & Dads program has continued to support the growth of our junior female cricket participation with 96 girls participating in these programs over 2022-2023 in our area.

The various Woolworths Cricket Blast programs including both club run blast programs and Cricket NSW supported programs across community and schools saw 84 junior female participants.

This growth of female participation in junior cricket in Newcastle is very encouraging and strongly supported by the availability of development programs such as Daughters & Dads and Woolworths Cricket Blast, and the clear opportunities that NJCA is providing for girls to move to club-based competitions. By investing in these initiatives, we are providing young girls with invaluable opportunities for personal growth, resilience-building, and establishing meaningful connections. Moving forward, continued support for development programs is crucial to unlocking the full potential of female participation and creating a vibrant future for female cricket in Newcastle.
